Recommendations

for standardized phonetics of Estuary English

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Transcribe EE as RP, including

- /i/ for the final/prevocalic vowel in weak syllables, previously written /i/ in RP, thus /'hæpi/ happy, /'veəriəs/ various;
- /u/ for the final/prevocalic vowel in weak syllables, previously written /U/ in RP, thus /ˈθæŋkju/ thank you, /ˌgrædʒuˈeɪʃən/ graduation;

but with the following changes:

- EE /ai/ for RP /ai/, thus /prais/ price;
- EE /\averace v/ for RP /av/, thus /m\averace v\theta/ mouth (cf. Cockney [m\averace{\pi}:f]);
- EE /o/ for final/preconsonantal /1/, thus /miok/ milk, /'mido/ middle;
- EE /?/ for /t/ when syllable-final and preceded by a sonorant:
 - within a word, when followed by a consonant other than /r/, thus /'fu?bo:o/ football, /'dʒen?li/ gently;
 - o word-finally, optionally at the end of a stressed syllable, categorically at the end of an unstressed syllable: thus /beot/ or /beo?/ belt, /'tɪkɪ? ˌɒfɪs/ ticket office, /ɪf ɪ? 'ɪz/ if it is;
- EE /tʃ, dʒ/ for RP /tj, dj/, thus /'tʃuːzdeɪ/ *Tuesday*, /rɪ'dʒuːs/ *reduce*.

In regard to the lexical incidence of phonemes,

- the participle/gerund ending -ing fluctuates stylistically between /ɪn/ and /ɪŋ/, thus /ˈrʌnɪn/ or /ˈrʌnɪŋ/ running;
- the suffix -thing is usually $\theta_{IJJ}k$ / rather than θ_{IJJ} , thus $\theta_{IJJ}k$ / anything;
- EE usually has /n/ for RP /nt/ in the items /'tweni/ twenty and /'pleni/ plenty, and for want and went when prevocalic, thus /'wpnid/ wanted, /wen 'æv?/ went out but note that there is no American-style nt-reduction in other items, e.g. winter remains /'wintə/;
- EE prefers /ən/ in various environments where RP would prefer syllabic / η /, thus /'ster(ən/ station.

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
